
## **Healthy Lifestyle Advocates Participate in NASPA Conference**

**Diesel Advisory Board** 



Wednesday afternoon Northern held a diesel advisory meeting. The diesel advisory board consists of a number of leaders in the agriculture, construction and mining industries that seek to hire graduates from the MSUN program. These members include mid to high-level executives from major companies in the region, state and the Pacific Northwest.

The Diesel Advisory Board was established to provide guidance, recommendations and support for improvement to the Diesel Technology program. The board meets twice annually, once in the fall and once in the spring.

During the meeting, the board was brought up to date on information from the legislative session, status of recruitment, retention, and graduation statistics and plans as well as other activities the board is assisting the program on. A significant discussion took place regarding creating a culture of safety on campus to reflect the current standards used in industry.

MSUN Fulfills \$250K Matching Grant From Washington Foundation



Montana State University-Northern received a symbolic check for \$250,000 from The Dennis and Phyllis Washington Foundation to help build the new Diesel Technology Center. This donation is the fulfillment of a matching grant issued by the Dennis & Phyllis Washington Foundation, in conjunction with Modern Machinery (a Washington Company). The challenge grant matched all new donations toward MSU-Northern's new the Diesel Technology Center project up to \$250,000. This grant is in addition to the \$1 million investment the Washington Foundation has already made to the project.

"We are very pleased to announce that we have raised the funds to fulfill this challenge grant. The matching funds came from a variety of donors, including cash gifts, pledged funds, and in-kind donations," said Jim Bennett, Executive Director of the Northern Alumni Foundation.

"We are very thankful for all the support that we have received for this project," explained Greg Kegel Chancellor of MSU-Northern. "It was great to be able to say to donors that because of this match their \$10,000 gift would become \$20,000," said Kegel.

### **Artist of the Month**

Her First Ride, Let Her Fly, Spirit, and Northern Rodeo Team ByJustin Goggles



To conclude the artist of the month series for this semester, the guest artist for April is Justin Goggles. Goggles is presenting a pencil collage including the pieces (clockwise) *Her First Ride, Let Her Fly, Spirit, and Northern Rodeo Team.* Goggles says he only paints as a hobby, "it is a very relaxing activity." In short he says, "all my grandchildren inspire me." One of his preferred themes are animals, primarily horses perhaps because he was raised on a ranch on the Wind River Reservation in Wymond, WY (he is from the Northern Arapaho nation). Goggles is also a US Army military veteran having served several years; he is also a former police officer in Browning, MT.

As far as the collage pieces, Her First Ride was inspired thanks to his granddaughter Aiyanna. Northern Rodeo Team, is about MSUN Rodeo Team. Goggles has a special place in his heart for Northern since his wife is a Northern student in the Civil Engineering program. Additionally, he participated in rodeo for several years.

Goggles has been drawing all his life, since grade school. He adds, "it is just a matter of grabbing a scrap book." He has been the artist of a couple of murals in Browning, MT, (where he resided for a few years). One of his murals was at the elementary school, and the other one in the middle school. As for the mural at the elementary school, in 1985, he was a teaching assistant. The mural was part of a project on teaching children how to draw. It was on exhibition for a few years although no longer due to repairs as time went by. It was about a Napi golden eagle representing the school. As for his work at the middle school, about ten years later (around 1995), Goggles drew a logo representing the singers/drum group of the Buffalo Stone Society. To this date, it is still proudly on display at the school gym.

## A Northern Technology Snapshot

**GPS Writing at Northern** 



Years ago I developed a GPS class exercise involving cursive writing on the land with GPS receivers. This exercise familiarizes students with GPS trackpoints. Trackpoints are GPS points connected with lines to form a path. Farmers use trackpoints to record their machinery paths and hunters and hikers use them to auto-map their treks. Researchers use them to map the travels of birds, wildlife and domestic animals. Waypoints are different and consist of individual GPS coordinates with names and attributes and are used to mark a specific location somewhere on the earth.

Featured with this article is a map of our campus displaying the results of last week's cursive writing assignment. Writing with a GPS receiver can be a challenging spatial task. The study of GPS, like most subjects, can be quite in-depth and involves many complex areas of knowledge. For example, geodetic datums (used for defining the shape and size of the earth and as a reference for maps) were studied by this class and students learned the importance of setting a GPS receiver with the correct reference datum. Several years ago I sent about twenty students out to write in cursive with a GPS. Later when importing their data files into a mapping program I noticed one student's name appeared to be written in cursive on top of the Student Union Building. I mentioned this to the class and again gave them the lecture about the importance of using the correct datum so positioning errors are minimized. Later that afternoon I received a telephone call from campus staff and heard from another instructor that one of my GPS students had been on top of the Student Union Building. I love creative writing!

### Add, Reply To, and Complete Comments in Word

Comments are a key collaboration and communication component of Word, and in Word 2013 & 2016 comments now include the ability to reply and mark as complete.

#### To add a comment:

- 1. Select the relevant text you are commenting on a sentence, a paragraph, etc.
- 2. On the **Review** tab, click **New Comment**, or you can right-click and select **New Comment**.
- 3. A comment bubble will appear. Type your comment in the field.
- 4. Click anywhere away from the comment, or press **Escape**, to complete the comment.
- 5. If you need to add to or edit your comment, simply click on the text and continue typing in the text field.

#### To reply to a comment:

- 1. Hover over the comment you wish to reply to.
- 2. Click the reply icon in the upper right corner of the comment box.
- 3. A reply field will appear. Type your reply in the field.
- 4. Click anywhere away from the comment, or press **Escape**, to complete the reply.

#### To mark a comment as complete:

Right-click on the comment and select Mark Comment Done.
