MSU-Northern Observes MLK with Lessons from the Civil Rights Movement



The presentation, *Making the Struggle Count: Lessons from the Civil Rights Movement* by Dr. Tobin Miller Shearer, illustrated how the strategies from the Civil Rights era offered didactical lessons in regards to nonviolence theory. Dr. Miller braided the stories of Ruby Sales, Jonathan Daniels, Stokely Carmichel, Ruby Bridges, Fannie Lou Hamer, Rosa Parks, Andrew Young, Wyatt Tee Walker, Bill Connor, and Charles Billups with the principles of nonviolence theory such as in warfare there is always cost involved and how nonviolence movements result in community action deeds, not just in individual endeavors. All those involved should always be ready to take risks and be aware that the possibility of action that might not necessarily be pacifist. Likewise, nonviolence deeds are ethical deeds of persistence, and many, many cases are not short term. Dr. Miller also talked about how the events planned by Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. were carefully organized and how during his time his proposals were very controversial. Only after his death has he been recognized and honored as a heroic pacifist leader. Dr. Tobin Miller Shearer is the Director of the African-American studies at the University of Montana where he is also an Associate Professor of History. He is a frequent writer, speaker, and commentator on historical and contemporary issues of race, religion, and the civil rights movement. His most recent book is *Two Weeks Every Summer: Fresh Air Children and the Problem of Race in America*. The Office of Diversity Awareness and Multicultural Programs (ODAMP) sponsored this presentation. Many thanks to all the students, faculty, staff, and community who attended and particularly Dr. Samantha Balemba-Brownlee and Jamie Underwood and their students for hosting this presentation.




Students Enjoy SALT Conference

Book Club: I Tituba, Black Witch of Salem

In celebration of African-American History Month in February, the English Department and the Office of Diversity Awareness and Multicultural Programs (ODAMP) are sponsoring the book conversation on this novel written by Maryse Condé. This historical fiction novel was originally published in French in 1986, but it was translated into English in 1992. It won the French Grand Prix award for women's literature. *I Tituba, Black Witch of Salem*, is about the life of Titubal, a biracial girl born in Barbados to a young slave woman and an English sailor. She is an orphan who grows up with an old spiritual herbalist named Mama Yaya. Tituba soon gets involved in the Salem Witch Trials situation, which only sets her up for more hectic events in her life. The conversation will take place Tuesday, February 27, 2018, at 5.00 pm at the Multicultural Center, Cowan Hall 308.
