MSU-Northern's College of Health Sciences would like to announce that the ASN and RN to BSN programs have received continuing accreditation from the Accreditation Commission for Education in Nursing (ACEN) for eight more years, with the next site visit in spring 2029.

Nursing education has been an established part of MSU-Northern's history and program offerings since the mid-1960s. The ASN and RN-BSN programs have been accredited by ACEN (formally NLNAC) since 1991.

ACEN's announcement of this full accreditation is a reflection of their review and evaluation of Northern's nursing educational practices and the commitment of its faculty. Accreditation indicates to the public and to the educational community that a nursing program has clear and appropriate educational objectives and is working to achieve these objectives.



#349 Annabel Cowan Chapel

In the mid 1960's Annabel Cowan donated pews, two lecterns, a chair, and a few other items to Northern Montana College for the express purpose of a campus chapel. The original plan was to have the chapel on the fourth floor (attic) of Donaldson Hall, but due to costs that never happened. The items were stored there for many years.

Then in 1989, Rev. Carolyn Keil of St. Mark Episcopal church along with a few others met with Interim President Dr. Frank Kerins and Tom Reynolds to get the ball rolling. Dean of Student Affairs Dr. Gregory Hauser and Director of Residence Life Bill Lanier were brought into the conversation and an area was identified in Morgan Hall for the Chapel. This area was a lobby at one time and was located adjacent to the old Morgan Hall office and the north wing of Morgan Hall.

The Northern Physical Plant went to work on restoring the donated items and Schubert Brothers Construction of Havre was brought in to do the work to convert the lobby into a chapel. Then on May 13, 1990, at 1:00 pm, a dedication ceremony was held at the Annabel Cowan Hall Chapel.

Dream is now reality for Annabel Cowan

A dream of Havre resident, Annabel Cowan, was realized last Sunday when the new campus chapel in Morgan Hall was dedicated.

Mrs. Cowan has always thought that a chapel on campus was needed. Twenty-five years ago she donated specially made pews, an altar, and a lectern to the college for a chapel. The items have been sitting in storage on the fourth floor of Donaldson Hall every since. About a year ago, a local pastor got the ball rolling to get a chapel built, but money was a big problem. Originally the chapel was to be built on the fourth floor of Donaldson Hall, but remodeling costs were just too much. The idea to put the chapel in Morgan Hall worked out. Someday it is hoped to move the chapel to Donaldson as originally planned.

Interdenominational services will begin in September with area pastors taking turns conducting the services.

The Annabel Cowan Chapel was in use for non-denominational gospel meetings, bible talks and even a wedding was held there. On campus residents also used the space for quiet meditation. Unfortunately, the chapel went by the wayside after about 15 years of off and on use.

NMC chapel fulfills local woman's dream

tion. Among those present at the birth-day luncheon was the Rev Carolyn Keil, pastor of Havre's St. Mark Episcopal Church. "It doesn't take much to get my enthusiasm flowing," Keil said "I thought it would be wonderful to get going while Annabel was still able to realize her dream." Joined by Lindsav Manaras and

realize her dream." Joined by Lindsay Manaras and other members of the Episcopal church's Outreach Commission, Kell met with Dr Frank Kerins, NMC president and Tom Reynolds, director of development at NMC. Both men supported the project But there was still a major stumbling block - money

The original plan, to house the chapel on the fourth floor of Donaldson Hall along with an art gallery and a collection by A R. "Toni" Hagener, requires restora-tion of the fourth floor — where

Cowan's donation was stored in a loft for the past 25 years.

There isn't any money at present for the restoration, nor for adding the elevator necessary to provide wheelchair access to the hall's top floor.

So, for the meantime, the chapel - NMC's first - will be located on the first floor of Morgan Hall on the east end of campus

Services are set to begin in September, with pastors from area churches taking turns officiating.

"I am really excited about this," enthused Kiel, "for two reasons. First, because it is a longtime vision of Annabel's This is something she's wanted to see through to completion and I'm happy we were able to help But also because this is an opportunity for the churches in town to reach out with the love of Jesus Christ to the students on campus without waiting for them to come to us

The church furniture, which was restored at the NMC physical plant, was originally built for a small Box Elder church attended by the Cowan family Mfs. Cowan donated the items in the 1960s after she moved from Park Elder the Name The from Box Elder to Havre The church where they originally were installed has since burned down

Mrs Cowan, a Havre native, said she was "really happy" when she learned that the chapel would become a reality. "I felt a chapel was needed and a worthwhile project," she said.
