For MAT's fifth annual 24-hour play fest, six different teams spent only 24 hours to create six fully staged 10-15-minute plays. Every year a headline from that day's newspaper is randomly drawn and every team must incorporate the drawn headline as a line of dialogue: this year's headline was: "I taught two dogs to fly a plane" taken from the *Guardian*. Additionally, each team was given a prop that they had to include in the play - those props were: a Yoda puppet, a whiffle ball bat, a stuffed walleye, a retro telephone, an overlarge key, and a football.

MAT had a crew of six people working logistics and technical aspects including MSU-Northern faculty and staff members Dr. Grant Olson, Dr. Kalin Amende, and Taryn Wallon. 
