He discussed the results and experience related to a recent evaluation of the Northern Lights' pre-season conditioning program. 



This article is on the Morgan Hall's dining area opening up. Prior to January of 1958, Northern students ate their meals in Donaldson Hall.

NMC students, upon returning for the winter quarter, immedi-ately changed from the old cate-teria in Donaldson Hall to the new one in the men's dormitory.


Mrs. Chan, dietitian, stated that the new cafeteria has many new facilities and appliances. Almost everything is electrically run, which makes the preparation of meals slower, but much cleaner. A new garbage disposal unit was also installed over the holiday season.

According to Mrs. Chan, there According to Mrs. Chan, there are of course many problems in this change. Recently, the dish machine, stove, and other equipment had to be repaired, and because of this, there was confusion in the kitchen.

The meals are served cafeteria style, and approximately 200 students can be served in 20 minutes.

Page 2 of "The NoMoCo" had this article that had the headline, "New Rules to Reduce Absences."

Six new rules have been set up pertaining to the handling of student absences and tardinesses at Northern Montana College. They are as follows:

- 1. Instructors are responsible for keeping an accurate record of class attendance, and it is their decision as to whether a student's absence is excused or unexcused, except for those absences excused by the administration.
- In the case of an unexcused absence final decision as to whether a student will be allowed to make up his work lies with the instructor.
- 3. Excessive absences or tardinesses will be reported to the student's faculty advisor and then to the office of the Dean of Student Personnel Services if the former does not bring satisfactory results.
- 4. A student may be dropped from class after three to five unexcused absences. The number of unexcused absences permitted should be determined by the credit value of the individual course. The instructor sends a drop card to the Registrar's Office and a duplicate copy to the student's faculty advisor.
- Three unexcused tardinesses will constitute an unexcused absence.
- Students can be excused only for illness or other emergency reasons by the instructor of the course on the class days prior to and following a college holiday.

Sixteen Williams and seven Patricias lead the popularity list of NMC student's names.


An amusing fact is that a common, and somewhat popular name, Smith, is the handle of only one NMC student.

In all, there are 250 first names at NMC.

In case you were wondering, the enrollment at that time was 492. Keep in mind also Northern Montana College was still on the quarter system. Northern did not go to the semester system until Fall of 1992.



With figures still incomplete, winter quarter registration totaled 492 as compared with 422 for a corresponding period one year ago, according to Dr. James H. Ashbaugh, registrar.

The men outnumber the women again in that 320 of the 492 are men and only 172 are women.

The rise in enrollment represents a substantial increase since last year. Registration of regular students continued during the first two weeks and night class enrollment is still to be added before complete figures can be tabulated.
