#### **Rylin Burns Named All-American**

The Lights wrestling team have finished their NAIA National Championship Journey for the season. The Lights will leave with one All-American, Rylin Burns. Burns took seventh play and is now a two-time All-American. Travis Waldner and Austin Vanek fell short from All-American status by one match. All-American awards are awarded annually to the most outstanding athletes in the various sports in which the program is active. Selection criteria are implemented by each sport.

## **MSU-Northern Hosts First Science Saturday Workshop**



Montana State University-Northern launched its new "Science Saturday" workshop series last weekend, offering educators of grades 5-12 innovative tools to enhance STEM learning in classrooms across the Hi-Line. Participants earned five hours of Professional Development Units (PDUs) for each session attended.

The inaugural workshop, *Science Saturday I: Fluid Mechanics*, took place at the Little River Institute in the Student Union Building. Attendees explored fundamental concepts of fluid pressure and density, utilizing common tools to measure these properties. The session featured engaging hands-on activities, including the interactive "Kool-Aid Cult Party," and discussions on adapting lesson plans for students with varying expertise levels.

Four educators participated in the workshop, representing Havre High School, St. Jude's, Cottonwood North, and Rocky Boy Schools. The hands-on activities focused on fluid mechanics, specifically measuring fluid pressure. Using hydrometers, participants measured the density and specific gravity of various liquids, including diesel, kerosene, canola oil, and motor oil.

#### Total Lunar Eclipse Created a "Blood Moon"

Last night, while many were sleeping, night owls witnessed the rare spectacle of a total lunar eclipse. Rather than disappearing into darkness, the moon took on a deep red hue, earning it the name "Blood Moon." The event began with a penumbral (partial shadow) eclipse around 10 p.m. on March 13, leading into a full eclipse, which occurred between 12:30 and 1:30 a.m. on March 14. These times were based on the most accurate astronomical predictions available at the time.

Interestingly, this celestial event coincided with the Jewish month of Adar, a time traditionally associated with joy and celebration leading up to Purim. In

Jewish tradition, lunar eclipses have often been interpreted as significant omens, particularly when they occur close to major festivals. The striking "Blood Moon" just before Purim may have reminded some of the themes of reversals and hidden miracles central to the holiday's story.

#### The Road to Resilience: Learning from Setbacks

Life and learning don't always go as planned. A tough exam, a missed deadline, or personal struggles can feel like roadblocks, but setbacks aren't the end of the journey—they're part of it. How we respond to challenges shapes our success far more than the challenges themselves.

Psychologist Martin Seligman, a pioneer in resilience and positive psychology, explains that our ability to bounce back depends on how we interpret setbacks. He identifies three key thought patterns that influence resilience:

- Personalization Do you see failure as a personal flaw, or as a chance to learn? Resilient people recognize that setbacks don't define their abilities.
- Pervasiveness Do you let one challenge overshadow everything, or do you keep it in perspective? A bad test score doesn't mean you're a bad student—it's just one moment in the bigger picture.
- Permanence Do you believe difficulties will last forever, or do you see them as temporary? Growth happens when we understand that setbacks are steppingstones to success.

#### Resilience is a Skill—Build It, Strengthen It, Use It

Resilience isn't something you either have or don't—it's a skill that grows with experience. When challenges arise, **reach out**—to professors, peers, and campus resources. Support is here if you need it.

At Northern, we lift each other up. **Every challenge you face is proof that you're growing.** Setbacks will happen—what matters is how you respond. Stand up, shake off the doubt, and take your next step forward.

You've got this. We've got you. Stronger together.


