
The day began with Academic Advising sessions in the SUB Ballroom, where students registered for upcoming Summer and Fall classes and received helpful guidance for their academic planning.

Chris Faber Selected as 2025 Commencement Speaker



MSU-Northern is pleased to announce Chris Faber has been chosen as the commencement speaker for MSU-Northern's 2025 graduation ceremony that will take place on May 10th in the Armory Gymnasium. Chris Faber was born and raised on the family ranch twenty-five miles southeast of Big Sandy, Montana. Chris attended public schools in Big Sandy and graduated from Big Sandy High School in 1985. Chris was a two-time State Wrestling Champion and two-time All-State Football Player.

Chris attended North Idaho College and then Northern Montana College, graduating with a Business Degree in 1992. He also received the Northern Excellence Award in 1992. Chris was a three-time All-American Wrestler in 1990, 1991, and 1992. He was also a Captain of the 1991 and 1992 Northern Championship Wrestling Teams. Chris was a team member of the 1990 USA Wrestling Team, competing in the U.S.S.R. (Russia) and Finland. Chris was inducted into the 2004 MSU Northern Hall of Fame as a wrestler and, later, the 2022 MSU Northern Hall of Fame as a member of the 1991 and 1992 Northern Wrestling National Champions.

Chris is married to Janna Dritshulas Faber who is a 1994 graduate of Northern Montana College. They reside in Havre, Montana, where they raised two children, Jonathan and Sarah. They continue their support of Montana State University-Northern. Chris still operates the Faber Ranch and also owns the Pinwheel J Ranch and Montana Outfitting Company.


Professor Receives the Japan Studies Institute Fellowship

Dr. Jaime Duke Leads Life-Saving CPR Training for Boys & Girls Club Staff



Last night, April 10th, Assistant Professor of Nursing, Dr. Jaime Duke and Jennifer Pula, taught the American Heart Association "First Aid, CPR & AED" course for staff members of the Boys & Girls Club of the Hi-Line. This course equips the staff with the essential life-saving skills need to care for the children attending the club. The hands-on class covered critical techniques such as first aid, adult, child and infant CPR, how to respond to choking emergencies, and the proper use of an automated external defibrillator (AED).

The training emphasized the importance of quick response times during cardiac emergencies and the crucial role CPR can play in saving lives before emergency medical services arrive.

Dr. Duke and Assistant Professor Pula stressed how vital it is for individuals who work with children and the public to be confident and prepared in emergency situations. The Boys & Girls Club of the Hi-Line staff left the session better prepared to protect the health and safety of the youth they serve every day.

Students Led Staff Appreciation Celebration

Dr. Kyra Kaercher Presented Ceramic Research at OTLE Brown Bag Lecture



On Wednesday, April 2nd, Dr. Kyra Kaercher presented her talk, "Qach Rresh: A Neo-Assyrian (950–600 BCE) Site Full of Post-Assyrian (600–323 BCE) Trash on the Erbil Plain," as part of the Office of Teaching and Learning Excellence's 4th annual Spring Brown Bag Lecture Series.

Dr. Kaercher shared recent findings from the rural site of Qach Rresh, located just 15 kilometers south of modern-day Erbil in Iraqi Kurdistan. She presented Nate Welch's (MSUN graduate CASE '24) role on the geophysics team, their new findings, the significance of the site, and her research into the ceramics and clays of the region.

Science Saturday Explored the Wonders of Astronomy

On April 4th –5th, local educators gathered for *Science Saturday II: Astronomy*, part of the ongoing "Science Saturday" series designed to support STEM education for grades 5–12 across the Hi-Line.

Hosted at no cost to participants, the session offered 5 hours of Professional Development Units and gave teachers hands-on tools to enhance their science curriculum. Attendees likely explored foundational astronomy topics such as the structure of the solar system, phases of the moon, planetary motion, and how light and telescopes help us understand distant stars and galaxies.

Student Spotlight: Sophia Fliegel

For Sophia Fliegel, finding the right path in higher education was not a straight line, but rather a process of discovery and determination. Originally from North Bend, Washington, Sophia began her college career at Montana State University in Bozeman. However, she quickly realized that it wasn't the right fit. Seeking a more hands-on learning experience, she made the decision to transfer to MSU-Northern, drawn by its renowned welding program.

Welding had already been a part of Sophia's life before college. During her senior year of high school, she took an introductory welding class and excelled so quickly that she bypassed the next level, jumping straight into



the advanced course. Her natural talent and enthusiasm for the trade made it clear that welding was more than just a class—it was a career path she wanted to pursue.

Since transferring to Northern, Sophia has found herself immersed in a learning environment that continuously challenges and excites her. Unlike other programs she had considered, Northern's welding curriculum offered a depth of knowledge and practical experience that she hadn't encountered before. Even with her advanced high school training, she found herself learning new techniques, such as switching out welding wire and mastering various cutting and brazing methods.

Sophia is also enrolled in a machining class, an additional skill set that she hopes will open more doors in the fabrication industry. Her goal is to land a job in fabrication, but she is keeping an open mind and is eager to gain as much experience as possible in different aspects of the welding field.

Beyond the technical skills, what Sophia enjoys most about welding is the camaraderie in the shop. She describes the environment as welcoming and supportive, where teamwork and humor go hand in hand with hard work. Being one of the few women in the program has never made her feel out of place—rather, she feels like she has a group of big brothers always ready to lend a hand.

When she graduates, Sophia will leave Northern with both her welding qualifications and an associate degree, well-prepared to enter the workforce. Whether in fabrication or another welding-related field, she is ready to take on whatever opportunities come her way. With her passion, skill, and determination, the future looks bright for Sophia Flegel as she continues forging her own path in the welding industry.

Rural Health Matters: How COHS is Making a Difference

Access to quality healthcare remains a challenge across rural America and right here on Montana's Hi-Line, the need is especially urgent. At MSU-Northern's College of Health Sciences (CoHS), we recognize this challenge and are acting. This fall, we are launching a new Emergency Medical Services (EMS) program to increase the number of qualified Emergency Medical Technicians (EMTs) serving Hill County and surrounding communities.

Why EMTs Matter on the Hi-Line

In rural communities, EMTs are often the first and sometimes only line of emergency care. From stabilizing patients on-site to transporting them safely to care facilities, their role is vital. According to the Montana EMS Annual Report 2023, ground ambulance services responded to over 132,000 calls in 2022, and total EMS requests exceeded 150,000, including more than 8,000 involving children.

COHS's EMS Program: Meeting the Need

The EMS program at CoHS provides hands-on training designed for the unique demands of rural emergency response. It is approved by the Montana Board of Medical Examiners and meets all requirements set by the National Registry of Emergency Medical Technicians (NREMT), making students eligible for certification and licensure upon completion.

Closing the Workforce Gap

Montana's Healthcare Workforce Strategic Plan outlines the need to strengthen the EMS workforce through:

- **Expanded education and training**, especially through regional and distance learning
- Public awareness efforts that highlight the value of EMS in rural communities
- Workforce support to improve recruitment and retention of EMS professionals

These strategies, supported by the Montana Office of Rural Health and AHEC, are key to addressing rural healthcare disparities.

Job Demand and Career Outlook

There is strong demand for EMTs across Montana. As of March 2025:

- Average EMT wage: \$18.73/hour
- Salary range: \$32,100–\$40,550/year
- Career advancement: Paramedics earn a median of \$53,180/year


