MSU-Northern Women's Rodeo Team Shines at Home Rodeo



The MSU-Northern rodeo team hosted a high-energy event at the Bigger Better Barn, competing against schools from Montana and Wyoming as part of the National Intercollegiate Rodeo Association circuit. Despite being one of the smallest schools in the region, Northern outperformed several larger universities.

The Northern women's team took second place overall with 340 points, finishing just behind the University of Montana-Western, which led the standings with 395 points. Montana State University followed in third with 200 points.

Individual standout Georgia Francis Orahood took third with 190 points after a two-way tie for first, each with 200 points.

The rodeo featured events including Saddle Bronc Riding, Bareback Riding, Bull Riding, Tie Down Roping, Steer Wrestling, Team Roping, Barrel Racing, Breakaway Roping, and Goat Tying.

The competition took place just a week after the Montana Legislature officially declared rodeo the state sport.

MSU-Northern Honors Retirements of Mary Brown and Trygve "Spike" Magelssen



On Tuesday, April 22, MSU-Northern held a retirement celebration in the SUB Ballroom to honor the dedicated service of Mary Brown and Trygve "Spike" Magelssen, who together contributed over three decades to the university.

Mary Brown retired after 15 years of service to the College of Technical Sciences (COTS). She began in 2009 under the Wind Montana and Youth Build grants and later worked with the TAACCCT III grant. In 2015, she transitioned into a full-time Administrative Associate III position, where she remained until retirement. Known for her attention to detail and extensive knowledge of university procedures, Brown was a vital support to faculty and leadership in the college. Her career also included work in law offices, radio, and faith-based organizations. She consistently sought professional

development through trainings and conferences, contributing to the efficiency and professionalism of COTS operations.

Trygve "Spike" Magelssen retired after 19 years at Northern, having joined the faculty in 2006 as an Assistant Professor of Electrical Technology. Over the years, he was promoted to Associate Professor with tenure in 2013 and Full Professor in 2021. An MSU-Northern alumnus, Magelssen played a key role in developing the electrical program's curriculum and lab spaces. His diverse background includes service in the U.S. Navy, roles in the private sector as a systems engineer and master electrician, and past work at Northern as a computer technician. He was deeply involved in campus life, serving on committees, organizing Yuri's Night events, and volunteering with KNMC radio. In 2009, students recognized his dedication with the Golden N award—the highest honor a faculty member can receive from students. Dr. Margarett Campbell, and Dr. Terri Hildebrand are also planning to retire this year. MSU-Northern thanks all our retirees for their commitment, professionalism, and lasting impact on the university community.

MSU-Northern Researcher Publishes Study on Turning Cooking Oil into Bio-lubricant

MSU-Northern is proud to share that Dr. Randy Maglinao's research has been published in the Journal of Supercritical Fluids. His paper, titled "Lignin valorization in biorefineries: A techno-economic analysis of a novel process for bio-lubricant production from lignin and waste cooking oil," explores a new, eco-friendly way to create lubricants from materials usually thrown away—like waste cooking oil and by-products from bioethanol production.

This breakthrough could change the lubricant industry by providing a sustainable alternative that turns waste into valuable products. Dr. Maglinao, from MSU-Northern's Advanced Fuels Center, worked with researchers from the University of Padova in Italy (Dr. Elena Barbera and Dr. Alberto Bertucco) and Old Dominion University in Virginia (Dr. Sandeep Kumar) to study the process he first introduced in 2019.

Their research proves the process is both technically sound and economically viable, opening the door for future commercial use. This innovation not only helps reduce waste but also has the potential to create jobs and boost local and national economies.

(#436) Northern 1964 MCC Swimming Champions

Did you know that prior to the Frontier Conference Northern Montana College was a member of the Montana Collegiate Conference (MCC)? Prior to the Montana Collegiate Conference, the conference was known as the Montana Small College Conference (MSCC).

Northern was a charter member of the MSCC in 1934 and transitioned to MCC in 1936. In 1966 MCC became the Frontier Conference. Also, did you know that NMC was the MCC swimming Champions? Here is an article from the March 2, 1964 edition of the Havre Daily News:

NMC Wins First MCC Swim Crown

Northern Montana college's swimming team won the first Montana Collegiate conference swimming championship at the NMC pool Saturday when the Maroon and Gold tankmen edged the Eastern Montana College Yellowjackets, 98-95, in what amounted to a two-way meet since other conference teams failed to put in an appearance.

The six-college conference adopted swimming as a regular sport this year for the first time.

Better balance and greater squad depth spelled the difference as Coach Arnold Keck's Northern squad maintained a slight edge in points throughout most of the meet. Eastern's squad carried off more first places. The splashers from Billings held a momentary 13-8 lead at the very start, fell behind immediately, and then regained the lead only once at 74-72.

In the first conference meet, all marks automoaically became conference records. And in winning the meet, the NMC team broke three of its own college marks. Gary Funk splashed to a 1:14 in the 100-yard backstroke and a 2:47-9 in the 200-yard backstroke. Then, in the final event of the meet, the Northern team composed of Richard Sapp, Larry Saksa, Ric Richter, and Ron Nessland, swam the 400-yard free-style relay in 4:22.1. The individual event results were as follows:


