The committee will provide written rationale to the originator, via the Academic Senate, when a proposal is disapproved and the proposal is returned to the originator. Upon completion of committee action, the proposal will be returned to the Academic Senate Secretary, and a transmittal e-mail sent by the Committee Recorder to the Senate Secretary, cc Provost's Administrative Assistant.
- 4. The Academic Senate considers the proposal and recommends approval or disapproval. If approved, the proposal is forwarded to the Provost for consideration. Steve was actively involved with the MSU-Northern campus. He was involved with various organizations and committees on campus, including: faculty Academic Senate member, Academic Senate Vice-President, and Academic Senate President, advisor for the student newspaper, served on the General Education Committee, (member and committee chair), and participated in a wealth of faculty and staff search committees.

Professor Steve Lockwood has truly been an asset to many programs on this campus, and an asset to the College of Arts, Sciences, & Education, MSU-Northern, and Havre. He has, through his role as an educator, positively influenced the lives and careers of many students. He is very deserving of the title of Professor Emeritus, a title he has truly earned. Therefore, the College of Arts, Sciences & Education whole heartedly recommends that Professor Steve Lockwood be awarded the title of Professor Emeritus.
